## DESIGN FOR BARRELS FOR PEN AND PENCIL CASES.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 11,737, dated April 13, 1880.

Application filed December 19, 1879. Term of patent 7 years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JAMES C. AIKIN, of the city, county, and State of New York, have originated and produced a new Design for the Barrels of Pencil Cases, Tooth Picks, and Watch Charms, of which the following is a description, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, in which—

Figure 1 is a side view of a barrel illustration ing my design. Fig. 2 represents, in a plane projection, the ornamental portion of the design of the barrel.

sign of the barrel.

The barrel is in the form of a cylinder, and it is ornamented by the representation of a vine running spirally round within its body and flush with the cylindrical surface. The spiral direction and the flush character of the ornamentation are shown in Fig. 1, and its facial configuration, consisting of the stem a, leaves b b, and flowers c c, is shown in Fig. 2. The ornamentation may be produced by painting or enameling, or by inlaying with metal, jewels, pearl, and stones, or either or any of these substances.

25 I am aware of the design patent No. 11,435, dated September 23, 1879, and hereby dis-

claim the design therein shown and described. The design therein consists of a spiral scroll formed in relief on the cylindrical case, and as such scroll projects outward from the surface of the case it presents a design entirely different from mine, as my vine is within the body of the barrel and flush with the outer surface thereof, and hence presents a distinguishing appearance from that of a scroll 3 in relief.

What I claim as my invention is—

- 1. The design for a pencil-case, consisting of a cylindrical barrel having the representation of a vine within its body and flush with 40 the outer surface of the same, and extending spirally around the barrel, as herein described and shown.
- 2. The design for a pencil-case, consisting of a cylindrical barrel having the spiral stem 45 a, leaves b, and flowers c, intermediate the leaves and over portions of the stem, as herein described and shown.
